Dear Members, and especially the vestry and my family,

I write this month to thank you for the wonderful opportunity you gave me earlier this month to attend the CREDO conference at Lake Logan Episcopal Center in North Carolina. Having a week away on retreat by myself would have been more than enough. Including the opportunity to worship and network with 24 other clergy near my own age made it even better. Adding in some excellent wisdom from a great faculty and time for reflection on how I could be healthier physically, spiritually, fiscally and in my work made it an incredibly deep and meaningful time.

This, in fact, was the purpose of CREDO. We spent time in large group lectures and workshops, in small group discussions, and in one-on-one sessions with faculty. We shared with one another our hopes and dreams, fears and frustrations, and were as vulnerable and truthful as I've ever seen a group be. We also ate and drank, worshiped and partied, danced and laughed together.

And in the end, based on what we discussed, what we learned, and how we saw ourselves and our work, we were asked to think about what things we could enact that would make us healthier and more able to be the people God is calling us to be. This became our CREDO plan. Parts of mine were intensely personal, and there are things I will be keeping between Allie and me. But below are a few of the things that most impact my work at St. Jude's. I have already shared them with the vestry, and now I share them with you. After each goal is a short description or reason that it was added to my list.

- *Begin a relationship with a trained counselor*. In order to do my job as a pastoral counselor, it is important for me to get help from someone in keeping my own self balanced and whole.
- *Learn how to ask for help.* I often take charge in events or projects around the church. I am also capable of letting others run them. I am not good at sharing leadership and need to learn how to do this by asking for help and being in partnership. This will be good for me in terms of time and good for the congregation in terms of taking responsibility for the church.
- *Commit to forwarding summer exercise into winter months.* The reason for this is pretty obvious; school schedule and caring for kids makes it hard to care for myself. I need to do this for me and them.
- *Clean and organize my office; seek help in creating a system for my administrative work.* While I don't mind a messy office, it creates a negative space for visitors and members of the church alike. Cleaning my space and creating a new office system will help me do the parts of the job I like least better and quicker, and give a better impression to the world.

Again, I thank you for the gift of this time away, and I look forward to how it will help me grow into a better person, a better disciple, and a better priest.

BOOK BAGS FOR READ AND FEED

Being Anglican and a Statement on Non-Discrimination

I was reminded this Tuesday, at the Vestry meeting, just what it means to be Anglican. From the beginning, Anglicans tried to create a Via Media, that is, a middle way, between the two great religious movements of the time. The Anglican Church chose to be neither Roman Catholic or Protestant, but instead tried to choose the best of each.

In the Episcopal Church, we have worked this ethos into many parts of what we do, our liturgy, our faith statements, and the way we make decisions as a church. While we do things democratically, we also try to listen to, respect, and make room for those with minority voices in the church. Therefore, what we decide is not always what the most people want, but what we think is best for the church. As a professor of mine once put it, you can tell it is truly Anglican if everybody is angry. Very often, on any number of issues, we take a stand that is not what those on either end want, but what everyone can live with.

A few months ago, Josh heard that a member of city council would be introducing an ordinance to make it illegal to fire someone, refuse housing, or refuse service to someone in the City of Fenton because that individual is or is perceived to be gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgendered. He asked the vestry if they would like to make a statement in regards to this issue, and the vestry chose to wait and get feedback from the congregation before making a decision. What they heard from the vast majority of you is that these are important protections that should be put into place in our community. What they heard from many of you is concern about how taking a public stance would look in the community, and the possibility of anger geared towards the church. And what they heard from a few of you was how hurt you would be if the church took a position or signaled an attitude with which you disagree.

The vestry, therefore, chose to take the Via Media, the middle way. Rather than making no statement when so many in the church were clear about the need for justice, they wanted to say something. However, to be sensitive to those who disagreed, they also chose not to sign onto anyone's campaign or make comment about the specific ordinance being considered. In the end, the vestry claimed the middle ground. This is what I love about the Episcopal Church and St. Jude's, that we are able to welcome and include many different people with different opinions, and love one another as children of God despite our differences. Not only does this keep us together, but it helps us learn and challenges us to grow in our faith. I want to thank the vestry for their hard work on this difficult subject, and hope you will thank them as well. Here is the statement they passed:

St. Jude's Church believes that all people are made in God's image and likeness (Gen. 1:26), and we have promised through the waters of baptism that we will "strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being" (BCP p.306). Therefore, we believe that it is wrong to discriminate against people in any way, since all people are our sisters and brothers in Christ.
