#### December 24th - Christmas Eve

#### 5:00 P.M. - Family Service

## A Thrill of Hope

Join us for Advent Reflection Sundays, 9:30 a.m., VandenBergh Hall - for Nov. 30, Dec. 6, 13, 20.

This study presents the familiar story of Christmas as told in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Each scripture passage is illustrated and interpreted in the stunning artwork of John August Swanson along with commentary by some of America's premier Biblical scholars. The DVD is divided into six 7minute chapters, each one featuring a passage of Scripture, commentary by the scholars, and a Swanson work of art based on that passage. Included are A Visit (Luke 1:26-38), The Nativity (Luke 2:1-7), The Shepherds (Luke 2:8-20), Epiphany (Matthew 2:1-12), Presentation in the Temple (Luke 2:21-40), and Flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15). #### **FAMILY PROMISE**

Our 4th week as a support church for the Family Promise program is fast approaching. We will need volunteers for the week of December 27th. Our role is to provide meals three nights per week (Sunday, Tuesday, and Saturday), overnight chaperones two nights per week (Sunday and Tuesday), and onsite support Saturday afternoon, when the children are not in school. St. Paul's Episcopal Church is the host church and we share the weekly responsibilities with its members, as well as, members from St. Dunstan's of Davison.

Family Promise provides accommodations, meals and assistance finding new work and living arrangements for Genesee County families who have temporarily lost their homes. The primary goal is to keep families together, something that no other shelter can do. Shelter and meals are provided at a different church each week, with each church taking four turns per year. In addition, each day while the children are in school, parents who are not at work stay at the "Day Center." At the Day Center, social services are provided to assist in finding work and permanent housing. The program can accommodate 15

family members at a time, but the number changes often as families find homes

Many of the families that have been through the program have now "graduated" and are in homes of their own, but still struggling to make ends meet. So this year, we are adopting two of the families as St. Jude's Christmas Families. Their wish lists will be posted on the Outreach bulletin board very soon and I suspect that those of you that have been Family Promise volunteers will recognize some names. It's great that we can continue to have a relationship with these families and help them on their journeys.

Please sign-up to volunteer either online or on the Outreach bulletin board. For more information about the volunteer jobs, go to the sign-up station on the St. Jude's website. Also consider asking a St. Jude's member, who hasn't had a chance to help out yet, to assist you. "Many hands make light work."

Or if you are new to the program, please note that you would like to be paired with an experienced volunteer. There will be a volunteer meeting before the work week to review guidelines and answer any questions. Those who volunteer to prepare a meal will be given the count for how many family members they will be cooking for. but the numbers can change day to day. You may want to shop a day or two before your assigned date.

Some parents hope for gas and/or store gift cards, and several of you have provided families with these in prior years. Please provide all purchased Scrip cards to the church office (or lock box outside the office) in a sealed envelope showing the **Family Number (#), Scrip cash value**, and **your name**. There are two convenient December Sunday **Scrip order dates: December 6 and 13 -- with Scrip Pickup dates the following Sundays on December 13 and 20.** 

As an alternative to purchasing a gift or Scrip, you can also **donate money**. If you prefer to donate money for a gift or Scrip, please write a check to St. Jude's, and note on the check it is for "Christmas Families." This can be placed in an offering plate, placed in the church office (or lock box), or handed to Carol or John Pettipher or any other Outreach Committee member.

**Volunteers** are also importantly needed to contact a family and mutually schedule a date and time to deliver the gifts to the Christmas Family (e.g., parent(s) between Sunday, December 20 and Thursday, December 24). 

My new favorite resource for observing Advent, Christmas and
Epiphany is The Season of the Nativity: Confessions and Practices
of an Advent, Christmas & Epiphany Extremist authored by Sybil
MacBeth. Here's an excerpt from the introduction:

Here is a skeleton snapshot of the Nativity season. Throughout this book more flesh, muscle and sinews will be added to these bare-bones definitions Advent, Christmas and Epiphany.

Advent recounts and remembers the events prior to Jesus' birth. For more than a thousand years, the ancient peoples who became the Israelites longed for a savior. They wanted freedom from slavery and captivity.

Abraham, Sarah, Moses, Isaac, Rachel and a host of other spiritual relatives trusted the One God to listen to their cries and send a Messiah who would rescue them. Advent recalls their longings, their dreams and their waiting for the One who would free them. The scripture readings, the themes and the songs of this season are full of the promises, prophesies and predictions of the Savior and Liberator whom God would send.
