Ensouling Evening Worship

Throughout the summer we experimented with a new liturgy on Sunday evenings at 5pm. Using Taize music, prayers and reflection time, we entered into a time of quiet contemplation. As the summer was drawing to a close, those who had been gathering reflected on their experience and whether or not we wished to continue this pattern of worship. The answer was a resounding yes! However, we will not be able to meet at the times we have been enjoying.

Beginning September 11 we will experiment with gathering weekly at 4pm on Sundays to share in this style of worship. As a contemplative service, this offers participants a chance to slow down, to quiet the noise, to pay attention to the still small voice of God. We also invite participants in this service of Ensouling Night Prayers to stay and join those who gather for Messy Church for at least the meal. It's a great chance to interact with this wonderful intergenerational formation and worship time. All are welcome!

Messy Church Intergenerational Formation And Worship

Have you wondered about that whole "Messy" Church thing that's been happening for some time now? Have you found yourself curious about or even pushing back against the name? Since arriving June 2, I have been attending this experience called Messy Church and I'd love to add some reflections on how I see both the name and the experience.

Over the years it has been my honor and privilege to participate and even to organize and facilitate several intergenerational experiences. Always I have found them to be times of great learning and often eye-and-soul opening "Aha" moments. There is much to be learned when folks at various stages of life and of faith gather together and share their experiences and their questions. Messy Church is no exception! What a joy to be a part of this learning and growing community! What a blessing to participate in gatherings that are rich, fun and full of wonder!

As you may know, "Messy Church" was born in the UK as an ecumenical group sought to address the changing culture and reach people who are not touched by "regular" church experience. When I first heard the words "Messy Church", I, perhaps along with you, wondered at the name. As I began to look into its birth and how it is lived out I saw the word "Messy" as perhaps describing the state of the room following the activities that are always offered. Yes, sometimes those are a wee bit messy. It's always fun to be in a creative space and not have to worry in that moment about the cleaning up!

For me the word "Messy" has another connotation. When I think back on my own spiritual journey it isn't a neat, following a prescribed order kind of a road. There have been ups, downs, road blocks, curves, beauty, challenge, joys, and it's been full of unexpected surprises - almost any descriptor you might imagine. In short, my journey could be described as rather "Messy". How wonderful, I imagined, that there is something that states right up front that the journey isn't necessarily neat and tidy.

Through my research I learned that there are many elements of the UK Messy Church that are required. One of these is a shared, simple meal. For me this is one of the highlights as we break bread together before going into the sanctuary and Breaking Bread around the Altar. Meal times are sacred times. This is one of those places where I can see a greater impact if we had more people involved. As I watched and participated in our Family Promise outreach I could see a dream beginning to take shape. I wondered what it might be like for teams of people to take a Sunday from time to time to provide and share in the Messy Church meal time?

This summer - in the midst of violence, political turbulence, and division - our Presiding Bishop and President of the House of Deputies wrote to the Church saying, "Jesus tells us to love God and love our neighbor as ourselves, and he tells us over and over again not to be afraid. There's no confusion about what Jesus is telling us, but it often requires courage to embody it in the real world. Again and again, we become afraid, and mired in that fear, we turn against Jesus and one another."

It is essential that the Church live into our call to be a source of sanctuary and seeker of justice for all God's children.

The next opportunity for anti-racism training will take place at Grace, Port Huron on September 24th from8:30-4pm. The cost to attend is \$15.

Attendees should be those leading or participating in any ministry of the Church, clergy, lay leadership, and all others interested in the ministry of racial reconciliation and social justice.



St. Jude's will again collaborate with Play Like Jackson and the Fenton Fire Department to give a truck load of food away from the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan on Saturday, September 24th. You can volunteer to sign people in, set food on tables, or drive leftover food items to community services. Work teams are scheduled for two shifts (set-up) 8:00 a.m. - 10:30 a.m. and(clean-up) 10:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. Meet at the Fenton Fire Station. September is also the time to gear up for the Annual CROP Walk on October 2nd. You can sign up to walk or rock, or give donations to those who are participating. Remember that CROP helps local, national, and international communities. St. Jude's Adult Classes


At one time or another you may have attended the St. Jude's Adult Class.
