Advent: A Time of Waiting. How are you at waiting? One of my most favorite pastimes is people-watching. Years ago, when I was travelling home from a conference, I was making a connection at a large and very busy airport. As it happened, the President of the United States was travelling through the same airport. I learned that day that all air traffic stops for Air Force One. That disrupts all kinds of travel plans.

It was early in my time in the United States, and I must confess, the opportunity to see Air Force One in person was exciting and I looked at this disruption as just one of those unplanned things. It wasn't going to pay to get upset about something I could not control. I saw that as wasted energy. That sentiment was not shared by most of the travelers lined up trying to reschedule connections that were now going to be missed. As I stood in line I listened to irate travelers screaming at the poor airline attendants who were trying desperately to ensure that everyone was rescheduled with as little disruption as possible. When I got to the front of the line the attendant apologized for my needing to reschedule my flights. Now, I'm Canadian and as a rule we apologize for everything – including things that aren't ours to apologize for. That day I explained to the attendant that she didn't need to apologize. She didn't choose when Air Force One was going to need to disrupt everything. And I apologized to her for all the angry travelers that had been yelling at her for the past hour or so. I thanked her for everything that she was doing to make everyone's travel plans as easy as possible. Then I found a place to sit and wait. As I sat I gave thanks for this unexpected gift of space and time as I sipped my tea, read my book and people-watched.

We live in a society that expects instant results. Pull up to a speaker and order dinner, drive a short distance and receive a complete meal. Drive up to a machine, insert a card, push some buttons and receive cash. Society, it seems to me, is not practiced at waiting.

Advent: A Time of Waiting. How do you wait? Throughout the Gospels we encounter story after story of people who had to practice waiting. They believed that Jesus would return any day now. Any day turned into any week, into any month and then slipped into any year and dragged into any decade. Here we are waiting and it's been centuries. That kind of waiting can, as the Gospels imply and experience teaches, lead us to a place of slipping back into old routines. Gospel writers often called the people back to their heart reminding them of what they were waiting for and how to wait.

Advent: A Time of Waiting. A time to practice waiting. A time to be called back to how we wait with God. What tools will you be using this Advent to practice what it means to wait? What helps remind you of how we wait with God? Let's share together our hints and support one another in this time of waiting. I look forward to sharing a holy time of waiting this Advent season!

ADVENT

This past week I met with the Worship Ministry Team and we began thinking about Advent and Christmas. It's hard to believe that Advent is just around the corner. The first Sunday of Advent is November 27!

One of the things that we talked about was the placement of the Advent wreath. In the past it has sat out where the Stewardship tree now is. This puts it right in the midst of high traffic during the time of Communion and many of the folks who need to walk past it wear flowing robes. Because of the fire hazard this can cause, we are going to experiment this year with placing the Advent wreath just behind the Altar rail. This led us to a discussion about Communion and the accessibility challenge receiving up at the Altar rail causes for some of our parishioners.

Along with experimenting with the placement of the Advent wreath, we will also be trying something different for Communion. For the seasons of Advent and Christmas (from November 27 through January 8), we will have a standing station at the base of the stairs leading up to the Altar area. After this trial time is over, we will be looking for feedback. How was this experience for you? This will help us determine how best to address issues of accessibility and safety as we move forward.

Reflecting on Messy Church:

In my time in seminary we lived a pattern that had been a part of my Christian journey almost from what I would identify as "the beginning." We called it "Action – Reflection." We were invited to reflect upon our various experiences (action) in writing, verbally, in small groups, in the larger group of my entire class, and in meditation. We then learned to take what we had been doing and theologically reflect on our experiences. It was a method that helped us not only to become self-aware, but it also steeped us in the practice of discernment. In the midst of the reflections we were being invited to pay attention to what God might be telling us and to discern how we might respond and join God on the journey. This intentionality is a process that has become almost second nature for me.

Over this past year, St. Jude's tried a new pattern for our youth and children to gather to grow alongside of adults. We used a format that emerged in England called Messy Church. An intergenerational opportunity for all ages to share in an activity, a meal, a Bible story with "wondering" questions, and worship. We've shared in this experience of Messy Church for a year and now we want to intentionally reflect on what's been happening. We want to take stock of what's been working and we want to name that which challenges us. Kris and I want to invite lots of folks to join us as together we discern what God has been up to in this Messy Church experience and to listen to where God might be taking us next.

For those of you who have found something powerful and meaningful in the way that we have been gathering, this time of reflection and dreaming is for you! During the process we will engage in on Sunday, November 13 we need to hear about your experiences.

For those of you who have found that Messy Church hasn't been particularly helpful in your spiritual journey, this time of reflection and dreaming is for you! We need to hear about your experiences as well.

For those of you who are interested in the spiritual growth of our young people, this time of reflection and dreaming is for you! We want to hear what it is you look for in providing opportunities for our children and youth to discover God and to make connections between scripture and life.

For our young people who have been participating in Messy Church, this time of reflection and dreaming is for you! We want to hear what you've enjoyed and what you could leave behind to make room for something new.

This time of reflection will take place on November 13 in the library from noon to 1:30. We will be providing lunch and child care will be available so parents and grandparents of young children can participate. We are asking you to let us know if you will be attending so we can make our lunch plans. Please call the office at 810-629-5681 and let Liz know your name and how many will be attending.

Kris and I will be working with the results of our reflections through November and December to determine where we need to tweak our children and youth program. Details will be provided in January's Beacon and through our e-mailed and printed weekly announcements as soon as possible.

In anticipation of the changes we expect to make, we will experiment with a new pattern for gathering through November and December. Each of these gatherings will be from 4:00 – 5:30 p.m. and no meal will be provided.


