On May 13<sup>th</sup>, I was honored to gather with folks from across the diocese and to join in presenting five candidates from St. Jude's to receive the Laying on of Hands as they were confirmed by Bishop Todd Ousley. What a joy to witness and share in this journey with Lydia Anderson, Molly Anderson, Bill Anderson, Leigha Forsyth and Arthur Pennington! This year we paired our candidates with Companions, individuals selected from the congregation and supported as they built faith-friendships with their Confirmand. I saw relationships develop and deepen as Companion and Confirmand shared their journeys together. That's a bond that I hope continues as both move forward beyond the day of Confirmation.

One of the tools Kris brought to Confirmation preparation was a Spiritual Autobiography. We asked that both Companion and Confirmand fill out their own and as a part of their journey together, share with one another their spiritual autobiographies. That's the one tool that I heard the most about as we neared the day of Confirmation and after that day I continue to hear about how powerful a tool it was for both.

The feedback we received made me wonder if this isn't a tool that should be used by all of us from time to time. To kind of check in with our life of faith as we remember how God speaks to us through all of our life experiences.

My challenge to you this month is to take some time to write your spiritual autobiography. The exercise that we used comes from the resource, "My Faith, My Life" and asks us to begin by listing projects and activities that bring us joy. It then asks us to identify three things that we believe about God, about ourselves, and about the world. Who are the people of today that we find inspiring? What are a few words or phrases that reflect who we are today?

We could then draw a path of circles on a page of paper and consider the important points in our lives. Along with describing that event and detailing what was important and how you felt at that time, I would add to their resource a reflection of how you see God in that situation or how that situation helped you see God in a particular way. My guess is that if we do this we will see our understanding and perception of God developing and changing throughout our life's journey.

Why not give this a try? And, if you like, head over to the blog on our website and write some comments about how you found this exercise. Was it helpful? Did it reveal any surprises? Is this a tool that you might continue to use as you move through your life?

I believe that Confirmation isn't just about the Confirmands and the commitments they made on May 13. I believe that Confirmation is another time for all of us to commit to supporting one another in our lives of faith; for each of us to recommit to living into an ever-deepening relationship with God; for each of us to do a check-in about our own commitments and how we are living those out in the church and in the world.

Thank you to all of the Confirmands and Companions for sharing their lives in such a way that helps me to reflect on my own journey. Thank you all for the honor of walking alongside you and of witnessing with great joy your deepening commitments!

## **Key Estate Planning Documents**

Your Endowment Committee continues to roll out in 2017 our new St. Jude's Endowment Funds program, including opportunities for giving (during your lifetime or later) to the Heritage Fund, Capital Fund, and/or Eternal Pledge Fund (each described in St. Jude's Endowment Funds tri-fold brochure available to you in our Library). Your Endowment Committee offered an educational event at church Sunday, May 21 featuring a presentation and Q & A session with Christine Waun, a very experienced, highly qualified estate planning attorney. She provided, reviewed, and discussed with us her handout Key Estate Planning Documents -- which is included for your benefit as an insert in this June 2017 Beacon. Your Endowment Committee recommends you contact Christine if you have any questions and/or wish to discuss or meet with her.

Some St. Jude's Endowment Committee members have used (or are considering using) Christine in the their estate, wills, and trusts planning and legal documentation. They believe Christine is a highly qualified and experienced estate planning expert. Christine reviewed her educational and professional background with us during our May 21 educational event meeting. Her website, www.waunlaw.com, notes she has a BA in Business/Finance with distinction from University of Michigan and a Masters of Law Degree in Taxation from Wayne State University. She graduated cum laude from Detroit College of Law, and is a member of the State Bar of Michigan (Business Law, Probate & Estate Planning, and Taxation) and Genesee County Bar Association.



#### **KEY ESTATE PLANNING DOCUMENTS**

There are a few key documents essential to implementing an estate plan. They are listed below along with an explanation of the purpose of each document.

#### **DURABLE POWER OF ATTORNEY**

A power of attorney is a document in which you, as the principal, appoint another person as agent to manage your affairs. This document is effective for <u>financial matters</u> only. A power of attorney may be "general", granting broad authority to make decisions concerning financial matters, or it may be "specific", granting only limited authority to perform one or more specific duties.

"Durable" means the power of attorney survives the disability of the principal and allows the agent to act on your behalf even after you have become disabled. The power of attorney is useful in avoiding court supervision. In the absence of a power of attorney, it may be necessary for a guardian to be appointed by a court to manage the principal's affairs and make the personal decisions for an incapacitated individual.

#### **HEALTH CARE POWER OF ATTORNEY**

With a health care power of attorney document, you, as the principal, appoint an agent to make health care decisions in the event you are unable to make your own decisions. The health care power of attorney is both durable (it survives disability) and springing (it becomes effective only upon the disability of the principal). Only one person should be designated to serve at a given time with a substitute named in the event the main agent cannot serve.

#### REVOCABLE LIVING TRUST

A revocable living trust is a written document that contains your instructions about how your property will be handled while you are alive and after your death. In the trust, you can appoint yourself as your own trustee (the manager of the trust) and name yourself as the lifetime beneficiary (the person who enjoys the use of the property in the trust). Most often, the trust includes instructions specifying that upon your death or upon the death of your surviving spouse, your children or other loved ones will become the persons who enjoy the remaining property of the trust.

#### **POUR-OVER WILL**

Although a properly drafted and fully funded trust-based estate plan replaces a will, a special will called a "pour-over will" should be a part of your revocable living trust plan. This document is a "safety-net" should you fail to put all your assets into your living trust. A pour-over will "pours" any assets that are not in your trust at death into the trust so that they can be controlled by the provisions of the trust.
