# Where have you witnessed the presence of God at St. Jude's?

This is the question that opens every Vestry meeting right now. The answers have been wonderful and our conversations are helping all to be aware of God's presence in new and different ways.

Yesterday as we unpacked that question the canoe and kayak trip was named as one of those places where God's presence was very evident. If it wasn't brought up, that would have been my answer as well. I've spent some time this week reflecting on Sunday afternoon's adventure and I'd love to share how I witnessed the presence of God in our midst.

Dave, Mike and I shared a canoe. It was Mike's first time in a canoe and we weren't quite sure how everything was going to work. As we arrived, Greg Forsyth met us and they had already talked to the staff at the canoe rental place so we were aware before even heading down to the water that if it didn't work out, we would receive a refund for the canoe rental. The staff couldn't have been more helpful or accommodating as we figured out the best way for Mike to get into the canoe. Greg snapped a beautiful portrait of Mike's radiant smile as he enjoyed his paddle up and then down the river. That smile brightened an already beautiful day as God shone around us all.

The river was very shallow as we paddled away. Often times the paddle swept up the silt of the river bed when we dipped a little too low for the level of water. At those times the sight of the fish swimming among the various grasses were clouded. As we meandered down the river I spent some time gazing beneath the surface of the water, noticing the variety of grasses, some of which looked oddly like coral. Different shapes, different colours, such diversity. The world beneath the surface reminded me yet again of the richness of God's creation and diversity. As the clouds of silt hid the scene, I was reminded of how, at times, God's presence seems cloudy in our lives. And yet, the reality is that the fish were still there as were all the grasses. God's presence, even when cloudy, is still very real.

Looking around at the grasses that rimmed the river and seeing the wildlife in their midst was such a joy. A crane was nestled in one bank of grasses, keenly eyeing the water for a mid-afternoon snack. At one point we saw a large turtle sunning itself on a branch, peeking out of the water. The peace that God extends was so very evident.

Half way through the ride we encountered the mid-way point, a dam. Most folks hopped out of their boats and walked above the dam to enjoy a refreshing swim. Dave, Mike and I could only see a wee bit of that part of the river, choosing to stay in the canoe, and what we could see brought smiles to our faces as the pure joy of the swimmers was flowing over the dam along with the water. God's joy in their swimming was tangible.

Most of all what I noticed as we paddeled away the afternoon, was the community that was built. As we moved through the water, conversations were taking place between folks that might not spend a whole ton of time together. We learned about one another. There were times that the beauty of community was very real. In our canoe the front paddler (me) didn't see some very large rocks, there were four of them, right below the surface. Before I knew it, we

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were hung up on one of them. As Dave and I pushed off from one, we immediately got hung up on another. And another. And another. And back to the first... If it wasn't for community, I think we'd still be there. Dave Andrejciw saw our dilemma and wasted no time in hopping out of his kayak to help guide us through the speed-bumps. How often in our lives do others appear on our journey to help us through a rough patch? That's God, reaching out through others, to help us along our way.

What a joyous afternoon we spent paddling the Huron River, learning together, enjoying the sun, the water, and one another's company. Thank you, Kris Forsyth, for organizing this intergenerational activity! Through our time together, God's presence was felt, God's peace enjoyed, God's joy radiating around and through us!

"Where have you seen the presence of God?" Will you share your experience and help us all to open our minds and souls to experience God in perhaps new ways?

As Vestry met September 20, we noticed in the budget that our pledge total is over \$4,000 below our expected pledges to date. Summer brings many travel opportunities for people, and we know that when folks are away,

We also learned that we are currently in a cash flow crunch so have suspended the writing of checks or using debit cards. We have approved a cash draw from our investments to cover the crunch (once the cash on hand dips below \$10,000, this is automatic as per our policies).

Because the Vestry wants to be transparent, they have asked Liz to include in our weekly bulletins, the amount of our expected pledges per week and the actual amount received. We also want to include in the Beacon, reports that will show you where we are at financially. If you would like to see a detailed report, please let the office know.

## **Community That Transforms!**

At a Vestry retreat we gathered to identify and discern a growing edge in this next season of ministry at St. Jude's. As we unpacked all that we had shared together, the energy seemed to center around enhancing opportunities to share faith and make connections that will develop and deepen relationships. Our vision involves setting an atmosphere where small groups can gather around common interests or perhaps around common life events.

In order to achieve this goal, we have invited a number of people we feel are gifted in harvesting "conversations that matter" to a workshop entitled "Community that Transforms". This workshop will take a look at the book called "Community: The Structure of Belonging" by Peter Block as we explore techniques to invite and harvest deeper conversations which can lead to the kind of atmosphere that fosters deeper relationships within smaller communities or groups.

This goal of the workshop is to design a way of moving forward as we intentionally build Communities that Transform. Emerging from this workshop will be many opportunities to sow seeds that can be nurtured as we welcome one another into Communities that Transform.

#### **Vestry Notes**

#### 1. Save Money, Increase the Comfort of Your Home for Free

#### 2. More Transparency about Pledges

When our budget for 2017 was approved at the annual meeting in January - it was a deficit budget. As usual, summertime brings many opportunities for our parishioners to travel more - which means that they are at church fewer weeks. This sometimes results in our pledges getting behind a little. Our pledges drive the budget and keep our programs going strong.

One of the changes we would like to make to the monthly Beacon, and to the weekly bulletins is to have a space where our current pledge status is easily viewed. This will serve as both a reminder for those who have not had the time to catch up on their pledges, but more importantly to celebrate the generosity of the congregation in helping to keep St. Jude's vital.

#### 3. Vestry notes

We are currently in a cash flow crunch. We will be drawing appropriate monies from investments, and will have the financial committee review some of the budget lines at their next meeting.

We will begin looking at ways to spruce up the church

for the upcoming 125th year of St. Jude's Church as it currently stands.

There will be a firm coming to look at the bell tower (which is in very poor condition) on October 7th. to make recommendations.

There are plans in place for a Christian Formation Ministry Team to be developed. Any interested parishioners are asked to speak with Kris Forsythe or Tracie Little.

#### Why Kids Need Halloween—A Christian Perspective

#### **Halloween Troubles**

I think Halloween gets a bad rap. Some Christian families don't participate because of the holiday's pagan roots and/or the perceived satanic overtones. Some Jewish families don't participate because of the holiday's Christian roots. Some families worry excessively about safety and confine their children's activities to sterilized trick'or'treating at the mall or in the church parking lot. Some adults have co-opted the holiday, using it as an excuse to wear over-sexualized costumes and drink pumpkin-flavored beer.

#### **Childhood Fascination**

And yet, Halloween continues to play heavily in the minds and imaginations of our children. This year, our third grade Sunday school class asked if they could wear their costumes to church. I denied the request, given that the holiday doesn't fall on a Sunday. Then, my 7th grade confirmation class asked if they could design and host a haunted house. Again, I denied them, given that a mere month would not be enough time to prepare. I can't deny their fascination; I think, in many ways, Halloween is a holiday that kids need to have.

Certainly the costume is a big part of it. Costumes help children confront their deepest fears. Rather than surrendering to the monster, they become the monster, and fear is transformed. Costumes and pretend play, imagining oneself as another, all serve a critical function in a child's self-development, as well as their ability to empathize with others.

Don't we all, even as adults, sometimes

pretend to be someone we are not? Sometimes it's exhilarating, sometimes it's exhausting. Think of the masks that we wear, the many ways we present ourselves to the world. So many of us wear a mask on a daily basis, not just in public, but even around those closest to us. We hide our true selves in a series of personas, costumes, and false faces.

#### Made in God's Image

As much as Halloween is a chance for children to explore different personas, it is also a time to remember that when we try to conceal the person God made us to be, our true self, it becomes very wearisome. God made us in His image, each of us special and unique. Yet we struggle to live into that image, adopting unsustainable masks that, if we wear them too long, make it hard to breathe.

What of the quintessential Halloween nighttime dash through darkened streets, seeking house after house, not knowing whether we will receive a sweet welcome or a scary rebuff? Don't we as adults often stumble blindly through the dark nights of our own lives, forever hoping to find an open door, a warm light, and maybe something sweet?

In Learning to Walk in the Dark, Barbara Brown Taylor writes:

"I have learned things in the dark that I could not have learned in the light, things that have saved my life over and over again, so that there is really only one logical conclusion. I need the darkness as much as I need the light."


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#### Multi Generational Program Plans for 2017-2018

The nursery opens at 10:15am on Sundays. Nursery staffers bring any children into Godly Play, generally, for the story.

Very young children and Nursery Staffers may return to the nursery to play afterwards until parents pick their children up for communion. If the children are 4 years old or older, we generally have them stay in Godly Play for creative time or "Work Time". All of the children who stay in Godly Play for work time join their parents in worship around the time of the Peace.
