Seeking and Worshipping God, Reaching Out to Others December, 2017 (Our 159<sup>th</sup> Year)

In the pocket of my winter coat I carry something perhaps a little strange. It's a hope stone. Basically, it's just a polished stone upon which I had written the word "HOPE." Today I've rubbed that stone inside my pocket so much that the word has long since disappeared. The knowledge that this is a stone to remind me of hope has not.

We live in a world that at times seems devoid of hope. Today as I write this it is the day after Thanksgiving and the news out of Egypt is dim. Yet another attack, this time at a Mosque, has claimed the lives of hundreds of faithful worshippers. Where is hope when not even a place of worship is safe? As the news stream travels to England, my eyes are assaulted with crowds of people fleeing what they believe to be another violent site, although at this time the news coverage isn't clear.

Yes, this is a world that seems conditioned by current events to live in a place of deep fear, of jadedness, and, yes, even a lack of hope. That's where my hope stone comes into play. I play with that rock every time my hand is in that pocket. I don't expect anything magic to happen. That rock is not a Jeannie lamp just waiting for a wake-up call so that the Jeannie trapped within the lamp can emerge and grant me three wishes. No, for me it's a reminder. A time to think about the hope that is found in Jesus. A time to remember that even when things seem the darkest, God is in the midst of every single situation. A time to re-tell the stories of God working in the midst of tragedy to bring about good. A time to recall and then to live the fact that we are a resurrection people.

By the time you receive this, it will be the "week of New Year's Eve" in the liturgical year. We will have celebrated Christ the King Sunday, the last Sunday in the church year. When we gather again to celebrate together on the first Sunday in December, it will be a brand new liturgical year (Year B for those of you who track these things). It will be the First Sunday of Advent. A season where we deliberately look forward in HOPE to the incarnation, Emmanuel, God with us. A season where we look not just for the birth of a wee baby; it's a season where we look for Jesus in the here and now as we prepare for Jesus' return.

The reality of God with us is that we don't need to live in fear. We are people of hope and right now the world needs God's hope more than ever. As an Advent discipline why not turn to the prophets. Read again the words of hope in times of fear. Look for that hope in today's world. And when you find them, tell the story! Be a prophet! The world needs those words. Throughout the season of Advent each Sunday liturgy will begin by asking the question, "Where have you seen God's hope this week?" To help you remember to be on the lookout, hope stones will be available throughout the season of Advent. Pick up your stone at church! Put it somewhere where you will see it often. Read the prophets. Tell the story! Remember that we are people of hope!

### Vestry – November, 2017



### **Notes from the Choir**

What are Carols? The carol is defined as a dance or song of praise and joy. The origins of carols predate the Christian era and were part of a folk tradition to be found at all times of the year. Since the Middle Ages, they have been more associated with Christmas.

Christmas carols, also known as *noels* (French for "Christmas") are found in Europe in the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> centuries, although one the oldest, Of the Father's love begotten (hymn 82) dates from c. 400 AD. In England, carols first appeared in print in 1426. With the Reformation, these Christmas songs exploded in popularity as the people sang in worship.

This year, we will have a carol-sing at 10 p.m. on Christmas Eve. We will enjoy selections from the congregation-as many as time allows. The service begins at 10:30. Our choir (with guest singers) and ringers will contribute to making the evening fun and special with the joyous music of Christmas. Have a blessed month.
