

A Diocece in Transition

Bishop Todd Ousley, the second bishop of the Diocese of Eastern Michigan, resigned his position in order to accept a call to serve with the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church as the Bishop for the Office of Pastoral Development. Bishop Todd's ministry with us was powerful and transformative and we sent him off with prayers and best wishes as he begins this new call. With his departure the Standing Committee had some decisions to make on how to move forward. Through prayer and conversation they discerned that the best next step for the Diocese of Eastern Michigan was to call a Bishop Provisional. A Bishop Provisional is a bishop who serves as the bishop of the diocese during a vacancy for an agreed upon period of time or until a new bishop is elected and consecrated. This bishop holds the ecclesiastical authority of the diocese and represents the diocese in The House of Bishops.

Diocesan Convention met last weekend and one of our first items of business was to hold an election for a Bishop Provisional. The Standing Committee works with the Presiding Bishop to nominate one candidate for Bishop Provisional and Diocesan Convention votes either yes or no. Standing Committee nominated The Rt. Rev. Catherine (Cate) Waynick for a period of one year during which she would be present with us for two weeks per month. Bishop Waynick is the retired Bishop Diocesan of the Diocese of Indianapolis where she served since January 1997 until her retirement. Prior to her election as bishop, Cate was ordained in 1985 serving as Associate Rector of Christ Church, Cranbrook and Rector of All Saints', Pontiac. She has held various positions at the diocese and in the Episcopal Church.

Cate and Larry have been married for 49 years and have two grown children. Living in Indianapolis, Cate and Larry enjoy travelling, cooking, bird watching, reading, music and spending time with friends. Having been born in Jackson and growing up in Tecumseh southeast of Ann Arbor, Cate is returning home to Michigan to walk with us in this time of transition.

Our next steps as a diocese will be for the Standing Committee to call a consultant who will also work with us through this transition. The diocese will then enter into a time of discernment about where we feel God is calling us to be and to serve in this next season of ministry. Regional meetings will be held throughout the diocese at various times and all of us will be encouraged to participate in these gatherings. We will advertise the dates and times as well as organize car pools for all wishing to attend. When a congregation finds itself in transition the work that is done requires everyone's voice to be heard. In the same way diocesan transition requires that same kind of participation so that our discernment can be as complete as possible. Please stay tuned and participate as fully as possible!

Please hold Bishop Ousley and his family in prayer as he transitions into a new call. Hold our new Bishop Provisional, Bishop Waynick, and her family in prayer as she begins her walk with the Diocese of Eastern Michigan. And hold the diocese in prayer as we step into a time of discernment.

All Saints Day

All Saints' Day is one of the major festivals of the Christian Year. The word "saint" in this designation is used in the scriptural sense of anyone who is a faithful believer. So this feast serves as a commemoration of all God's "servants departed this life in thy faith and fear."

The day revolves around all the faithful servants and believers of God—living and those who have died. We are always surrounded by a "cloud of witnesses (Hebrews 12:1); those faithful Christians who have died. When we die, a new and everlasting life begins with God and others who have died before us. The sacredness of persons is celebrated, remembering that they are all creations of God.

Baptism is an important element of All Saints' in that it is the sacrament of Christian initiation that all Christian saints, living and dead, share as members of the Body of Christ.

The unique personality, gifts, talents and experiences of every individual are given by God to be valued and used in the building of the Kingdom. Being good stewards of God's gifts means looking at our lives for clues about what we have to offer that will serve others in Christ's name. To become the people God intends us to be is to find our greatest happiness and deep fulfillment.

In talking with children about All Saints, we can share the following:

- We are all called to be saints, using our talents and lives to serve others, loving them as God loves us.
- Famous saints are examples, showing us how to be followers of Jesus.
 - When we die, it is the beginning of a new life in which we join with others who have died and are close to God and Jesus.

• Life in the kingdom of God is life in a new way, without sorrow or pain, a life of joy.

Some Activity Ideas for All Saints

Many groups, especially Asian Americans, use All Saints' Day as an opportunity to remember and respect family members who are elderly or

who have lived in other generations. This might be the occasion for telling about where our families have come from and lived, what their lives were like, and what values that we honor they have passed on to us.

Our names are symbols of who we are, and our Christian names tell who we are in our new life in Christ. A study of names and their meanings, of how our names show we are particular people loved individually and personally by God can help us see ourselves as particular saints of God whose lives are offered in loving service.

Very young children and Nursery Staffers may return to the nursery to play afterwards until parents pick their children up for communion. If the children are 4 years old or older, we generally have them stay in Godly Play for creative time or "Work Time". All of the children who stay in Godly Play for work time join their parents in worship around the time of the Peace.
