Seeking and Worshipping God, Reaching Out to Others

March, 2018 (Our 160th Year)

Today as I write this it is the day after a lot of rain. A lot. We are in the midst of a River Flood Watch. A watch that will be active for the entire week. As I drove in today I noticed how much standing water there was. Everywhere. Water that has spilled over its banks. Water that has shown up where it never used to be. Last night as I tried to sleep, all I could think about was, "What happens when the water moving into the sump pump is greater than the ability of the sump pump to move it out? How long between each time the sump pump activates?" Well, the answer to that second question I discovered by using the stopwatch function of my cell phone. First it was 45 seconds, then 40. And I started to worry. What happens when the sump pump can't keep up? That led to a mostly sleepless night as I counted the seconds between when I heard the pump empty.

Water. Something that brings us life. Something we can't live without. Something through which we pass in order to be born into a new life. A life rooted and grounded in Christ. A life that participates with God in the unfolding of the Realm of God. As I lay awake last night, I started remembering what it means to pass through the waters of baptism. Waters that lead to transformation. First, our transformation. And then the transformation of the world as we work more and more deliberately to participating in what God is already up to – revealing the Realm of God that is present here already and yet is not complete. The waters of baptism change everything. As Paul teaches us in his letters, everything that is old has passed away and everything new lies before us.

That isn't easy. Thinking about what that transformation might mean in our basement wasn't easy. I'm not even sure where to begin those thoughts. They are overwhelming to say the least. So much so that I think a generator will be in our future fairly quickly. I'm not sure what good that will be if the water entering the sump pump is ever so great that its power to pump it out is overcome. But at least it's something to help calm the nerves.

The change that is recognized through Sacrament in baptism isn't always easy either. The path that we're on in our journey of faith isn't always calm and steady. It, too, is full of mountain-top experiences when the presence of God is very real. It's also full of valleys where God's presence is more of a challenge to see. And it's full of routine and everyday happenings of life.

Throughout Lent we are asking the question, "Where have you witnessed God's activity?" As you become aware of your answers to that question, it might be helpful for you to reflect on some others, whether or not your seeing God's activity has been easy. What has helped you to see God's activity? How did you recognize it as God's activity? What blocks your ability to see God's activity? How might you remove that which blocks? How might we, as a faith community, support you as you remove the block?

May the remainder of your Lenten journey be one that brings you into deeper relationship with God. May the Easter celebrations that are right around the corner be Holy.

HOLY WEEK LITURGIES



Our Holy Week begins with our Palm Sunday service, MARCH 25. At our 8 am and 10:30 am services, we will join with Jesus and the disciples as they triumphantly entered Jerusalem.



Monday, MARCH 26, if there is enough interest, we will rent a Chatres Labryrinth mat and host a walk at 7 pm. Because of the cost of the rental, we are asking you to let us know if you would be attending. A sign-up sheet can be found in VandenBergh Hall or you can call the office to let us know you are interested.

If there is not enough interest in a Labyrinth Walk, we will gather to share in an Iona Evening Prayer service.



Tuesday, MARCH 27, at 7 pm we will continue our journey as we gather to share in a Taize service.



Wednesday at 7 pm on MARCH 28, we will gather for our Tenebrae service. Tenebrae is Latin for "shadows" or "darkness." During the service candles are gradually extinguished while a series of readings and psalms are read.



Maundy Thursday, March 29, 7 pm

The Liturgy begins at 7:00 pm for Holy Eucharist with the Footwashing Ceremony. Following the service we ask that when you leave you do so in silence as the church will remain open for all those wishing to remain to spend some time in quiet prayer and reflection. A prayer vigil will take place throughout the night.

Good Friday, March 30, 3 pm and 7 pm

At 3 pm we will gather for an interactive multi-generational experience of Good Friday.

We continue our three-day celebration at 7 pm for our Celebration of the Lord's Passion, including the Solemn Intercessions and Veneration of the Cross. Once again we ask that when you leave you do so in silence. The church will remain open for all those wishing to remain and spend some time in quiet prayer and reflection following the 7 pm Liturgy.





Great Vigil of Easter, Sun. April 1, 7 am

This is our "Night of Nights" when we will gather at 7:00 am to kindle the Easter fire, light the Paschal torch, proclaim the great stories of salvation, renew our baptismal promises, and celebrate the first Eucharist of Easter. Following the Liturgy we will share in our annual Easter reception. A pot-luck breakfast will be served between the Vigil and the 10:30 am service.

Easter Morning, April 1, 10:30 am

The First Sunday of Easter brings the Paschal Triduum to a close and launches us upon the great fifty-day season of Easter. Come to Eucharist at 10:30 am.

Every day they continued to meet together...they broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts.



AN ECO-FRIENDLIER ST. JUDE'S

An Experiential Good Friday Service

Our experiential Good Friday Service is derived from Christian Formation guru Gretchen Wolf Pritchard's Prayer Walk which is part of her internationally known *Palm Saturday* program.

We will start in the library with a simple gathering time activity—I hear we might prepare some "Resurrection Rolls" during that time. Then, we'll head into our worship space to journey together in Christ's footsteps during Holy Week. Our Prayer Walk will include:

- The triumphal entry into Jerusalem.
- The Last Supper.
- The arrest, trial and crucifixion including the procession of the cross.
- The stillness of the tomb.
- Emergence out of the tomb into the light.

During Prayer Walk, after we welcome Jesus with our palms and hosannas, we will proceed up to the altar area. Adults may sit on the chairs and children are encouraged to sit on the carpet squares provided. We encourage everyone to join in the singing during Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, distribution of the bread and juice, the foot washing and the procession of the cross. We are all INVITED but not EXPECTED to do anything during the Prayer Walk. For instance, if you'd rather not have your feet washed or

you'd rather not take a turn carry the cross, that's perfectly fine.

We will eventually make our way to the tomb—possibly the Sacristy or the kitch-

en as these rooms have no windows. It will be dark and quiet for a few moments. We will then finish our Prayer Walk back in the library where we will conclude by opening our Resurrection Rolls—just a hint of what's to come at Easter. We may also have a couple of other surprises then too.

We will need a little help with the storytelling part of the Prayer Walk and with the Resurrection Rolls. Please consider participating in one or more of the following roles:



Like the stations of the cross, the Prayer Walk treads the very fine line between story, prayer, liturgy and play.
