Rector's Report

4-18-18 Vestry Meeting

Tracie reported that the Holy Week services were well received and that she was able to make some innovations in liturgy which received good feedback. She will be on vacation May 11-19 and the Vestry decided to go forward



with the May meeting with Senior Warden Ty Fry leading the meeting.

Kathy Kortge reported the repairs to the drain and concrete were completed in the parking lot. She noted that the Freeman brothers donated the work and Marcia and Bill Freeman donated the concrete.

She identified an additional safety issue needing attention with the other drain which has a void beneath it. We will obtain an estimate and endeavor to complete the repair on a timely basis so long as it is below the amount authorized by the Vestry.

The Vestry has a new committee working on the Sanctuary Project which met and informed us of their recommendations. They have prioritized the repairs ranking repairs directly related to safety. They will begin a process of getting estimates which clarify the scope of the project, cost assessment, etc. at which time they will move to identifying funding sources such as grants, fundraising etc.
