Rector's Report

I tread the line between introvert and extrovert and by Sunday afternoon I'm often ready to fade into the furniture for a short while to recharge. As I



anticipated attending the play I was feeling like I was going to stand out and I was worried about that.

You know what I discovered? I totally forgot about the colour of my hair! I was enjoying being with my family for dinner and joining the rest of the group as we attended the play. It likely helped that we were the last ones to arrive and everyone was anticipating my wonderful new style! Denise did an amazing job as my on-the-spot hairdresser! I was even told that the new colour was becoming! If I'd been at all uneasy, that one comment would have served to put me at ease. I could relax! The folks I would be with didn't have any problem with my "standing out" and really, that standing out was more in my overactive imagination as the green was more of a highlight than a deep, all-over colour.

Why I ever doubted that my St. Jude's family and my family would ever have a problem with this, I will never know. Everything I've ever experienced here at St. Jude's tells me differently. This is one of the most accepting and loving places I have ever experienced! I should never have doubted!

I've been reflecting on that experience since the day of Crop Walk. How is it that we can make someone who looks like "the other" feel at ease and comfortable in our midst? My prayer is that my green-hair experience will help us all, starting with me, to be very intentional about knowing how to shine God's love into this dark and needy world. May our stories of our experiences help others to see, respond to and share God's love. May the love that we know and share be so unreasonably huge that we see both ourselves and the world around us change! For me it all begins with a wee can of green hairspray. Vestry News

On October 17th the Vestry met and reviewed the Church Financials with the assistance of the Treasurer Michelle Gangwer. Michelle noted that revenues are running lower than expenditures and that as of the September 30th reports we are running a deficit. Pledge income has been improved with an approximate \$2300.00 in arears. Expenditures are continuing to run higher than projected. Vestry approved repairs to the parking lot due to safety concerns. Michelle led a discussion regarding implementing a Cash Management account to assist when there are unexpected expenditures. The Vestry discussed and agreed that the Endowment and Financial Committee be allowed to merge as one committee after researching and addressing by-law changes.

St. Jude's received a grant of \$1200.00 from the Diocese to be used toward the repairs to the Bell Tower. Ron Trimmer reported that the Project Team were happy to report that the Bell Tower while it has some safety issues and maintenance is essentially a sound structure and that the plan is to tackle each area of maintenance as we raise funds to cover the cost. The Sanctuary renovations are continuing with work on the altar rail and some lighting changes to come. There is some discussion about the choir moving behind the altar.

Tracie discussed the Stewardship Harvest Ministry Sunday planned for Oct. 28th which is going to include information on the Pledge Drive included at the event. The Youth are planning an event to put together "Care Packages" for our College/Military youth. Kathy Kortge reported scheduling the carpets to be cleaned soon. Ramp repairs are planned and Dan White and other volunteers are moving forward to improve the ramp. Tracie discussed the sound system funding raised is approximately \$10,000.00 (a check is expected soon) and improvements are being

planned – so listen up!

Some of the upcoming events are: Harvest Sunday–Stewardship/ Ministries – Oct. 28th, Nov. 4th a service will celebrate the Read & Feed Ministry we shared with 1st Presbyterian, Bocce Ball is planned on Nov. 4th also Family Promise is planned for the week of 11/25 – volunteers needed.

Most Sundays mid September thru late May


For children in Pre-K thru Grade 5. We meet in the Godly Play room (follow signs) in basement. We start at 10:25am. We rejoin parents for communion.
