Rector's Report

2007 when The was Human Body exhibit came to the Detroit Science Center. Over 100 anatomical displays of different systems within the human body clearly showed just how complex and interwoven our bodies are. As I slowly made my way around the displays, I can remember being absolutely amazed at what our Creator God had accomplished in sculpting our human bodies. It also became increasingly clear just how interrelated our bodies are. It wasn't hard to see why an injury in one part of the body influences so many other systems and areas.

Since last summer I've been struggling with back issues. The pain was shooting down my leg and created a limp that began, more recently, affecting my upper back on the other side. Finally, I'd had enough and I got myself into the doctor and then into physical therapy. It's only been a couple of weeks, but what a difference! The pain is just about gone and I'm able to return to some of the things I had been doing months and months ago, at least for short periods of time. The pain in my leg and the pain in

my upper back are so much better, only bothering me when I overdo my activity levels. Once again, I was reminded of my experience in The Human Body exhibit and how interconnected we all are.

Our interconnectedness isn't only about the various physical parts of our bodies. We're also emotional and spiritual beings. All of those parts, physical, emotional and spiritual, are interconnected. When something affects any one of those areas, all of those areas are affected. What I found when I was in pain all of the time was that I was also emotionally exhausted by

the end of the day. Just getting through my normal activities was physically draining and that, in turn, also drained my emotions. Spiritually I was a bit disconnected as well, needing to spend more time on just getting through the day.

As members of the Body of Christ, we are not just interconnected within our own selves. We're also connected to one another and to all of creation. That's an important, even essential, reality. We are all connected. You and I and all of God's creation. We discover and live into that interconnectedness in so many ways.

We do this, I believe, because we know what it means to us to be connected to God. We've experienced God's love and care through someone's response to our need at some point in our history. Jesus showed us what it means to live our interconnectedness and we, having experienced that relationship, follow Jesus's example and teaching. We go and do likewise.

I wonder... how have you experienced being connected to God, God's love and creation? How do you live into your interconnectedness today? How might God be calling you to deepen your connectedness in the future?



Let the Children Come to Me

How do we welcome young children at St. Jude's? Currently, we invite children

to Godly Play which takes place during the Liturgy of the Word at the 10:30 service. Children are welcomed into that one-room classroom by the Storyteller and by the Doorperson or Shepherd who is a volunteer. Children are then returned to their parents and/or grandparents at about 11:15 in time for Eucharistic Prayer (Communion).



How Do We Welcome Children & Parents?

During their time in worship with the rest of the congregation, children are invited to pick up a Worship Bag or Busy Bag. These bags are for two different age groups. The smaller, color bags are for pre-schoolers & kindergartners. The larger, ivory colored bags are for older elementary age children or 1st Graders—5th Graders. The toys and books inside the bags are especially intended for these age groups. Most of the items in the bag have religious themes. These bags may be borrowed during the worship service and then we ask that the bags be returned after the service for use at the next worship service.

Our nursery is closed at this time because we haven't had nursery age children at St. Jude's for awhile. We had to let our

nursery staffers, who also assisted in Godly Play, go, recently, due to financial constraints. My understanding is that if we have families come aboard who need nursery care, we'll reevaluate. We might recruit volunteers to take turns, at that point. It has been our tradition, recently at least, to re-

turn nursery age children to their parents in the worship service in time for communion.

What are some other ways we welcome children? We provide Advent and Lent-to-Go Bags. These bags invite families to observe the seasons of Advent and Lent at home. Frequently, we also provide materials to borrow from the Christian Formation table as well. These might include books, coloring sheets and more.

A couple of years ago, the new high chairs were moved down to the basement. I assume the chairs were moved down because they weren't being used regularly. However, the presence of high chairs in Vandenburg Hall sends a message. When they are present, they let people

know that, at the very least, young children are welcome at St. Jude's. The presence of (ideally, clean and well cared for) high chairs let parents

know that we love children and want to support parents in bringing their children to church.

Somewhat recently, we hosted a large funeral reception where many young children were present but the high chairs were missing. We have an opportunity, at every gathering held at St.

Jude's, to send explicit and implicit messages to people present.

Another wish is for a library display stand, something small, which we could add to our library. I would display books, appropriate to the season, for children and youth. In this library display, I might also add share books which might support parents in raising strong, healthy, faith-filled children. Ideally, the display might allow for the sharing more than the three or four books I can fit on my Christian Formation display table. I would be happy to lend these books out.

Another idea that's re-emerged for me is to create a PRAY GROUND in our worship space. In our case, a Pray Ground might be created in the area our

choir used to occupy. I abandoned the idea a few years ago because we couldn't imagine how we could create a space which would allow children to still see what's going on at the altar. Now, with the altar moved forward, children would be able to see. In that space, we might put an area rug, a small table or two, a small shelving unit, a couple of comfy floor pillows, maybe

a little bouncy seat for babies. All the activities in the Pray Ground would be quiet ones. The space would allow children to move about a bit and play quietly. Parents could sit nearby. Again, the presence of such a space would send the message that children are welcome and valued here at St. Jude's. It would suggest to parents that we want to make it easier for them to bring their children to church.
