Phase 3 Re-opening

Third Sunday after Pentecost - June 13, 2021

Hello dear friends!

These past 16 months have been long and we have all been grieving and praying for the day when we could return to worship inside the sanctuary. That day is almost here! The Diocesan team responsible for determining the steps of our re-entry, has released us into Phase 3 of our plan **beginning July 1.**

There are no social distancing requirements in this phase so all of the pews will stand ready to welcome you! Regular cleaning will still, of course, take place, however, in this phase we are not required to clean everything before and after every service.

Services:

Our 8am service will continue to be a service of Morning Prayer offered only online.

Our 10:30 am service will be a Eucharistic celebration. We will return to using our home-baked bread, however, wine will not be distributed at this time. You will continue to sign in so that we have contact tracing information should we need to contact you. The Peace and the Offertory will continue to be touch-free.

Mask protocol: Masks are encouraged inside the building but they are not required. If you are unvaccinated or if you are working with a vulnerable population (our youngest children who are not eligible to receive vaccinations and the immunocompromised), we are strongly encouraging you to wear a mask for your own protection. Masks will be worn as Communion is distributed.

Coffee Hour: Coffee hours will take place, however, buffet presentations are not allowed in this phase. Hosts will need to serve both beverages and food to eliminate common contacts.

If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact me! I look forward to worshipping with you as we safely re-enter the building!

Our True Selves

We know that when Christ appears, we shall be like him.

1 John 3:2



Inside my parents' old photo album is a picture of a young boy. He has a round face, freckles, and straight, light-blond hair. He loves cartoons, hates avocados, and owns just one record, by Abba. Also inside that album are pictures of a teenager. His face is long, not round; his hair is wavy, not straight. He has no freckles, likes avocados, watches movies rather than cartoons, and would never admit to owning an Abba record! The boy and the teenager are little alike. According to science they have different skin, teeth, blood, and bones. And yet they are both me. This paradox has baffled philosophers. Since we change throughout our lives, who is the real us?

Moving Forward from our Bishop's Suspension

Dear Friends in Christ,

We write today with news about our life together at the conclusion of the suspension of our bishop, the Rt. Rev. Whayne M. Hougland, Jr.

After a series of lengthy, honest, and occasionally painful conversations, the Standing Committees, Diocesan Councils, and Bishop Hougland have reached a separation agreement that will result in his resignation as Bishop Diocesan of Western Michigan and as Bishop Provisional of Eastern Michigan, effective July 1, 2021.

The Joint Standing Committees of Eastern & Western Michigan

People of Eastern & Western Michigan,

Over the last several months, the bishop and leadership of the two dioceses have undergone a period of mutual discernment that has led us to this current moment.

The Joint Standing Committees began early this Spring preliminary conversations Bishop Hougland about how we would undertake this discernment. Lay and clergy leaders met in Affinity Groups for pastoral processing of the last year. We received hundreds of submissions to a written survey from our laity and clergy, articulating reflections about our life together as dioceses and in relation to the episcopacy. And recently, a series of conversations were held in which our clergy community met with Whayne, hearing what he has done and experienced over the last year and sharing with him what they had done and experienced over the last year. These conversations were difficult, honest, and holy.

After every step, we would sit back, review the gathered feedback, and determine together whether we would continue on in conversation. Though we had anticipated another series of conversations and surveys as part of our continued discernment, it was clear, based on the responses we had already received from you, and out of concern for the emotional toll on our dioceses, that this process had come to a conclusion. This does not mean that we don't love and care for one another -- simply that we know and understand that our continued mission and ministry, including our growing relationship between our two dioceses, would be impeded by reinstatement to office.

A Pastoral Word from the Presiding Bishop

My Sisters, Brothers, Siblings,

The Episcopal Church proclaims that "[b]y virtue of Baptism, all members of the Church . . . shall . . . seek to resolve conflicts by promoting healing, repentance, forgiveness, restitution, justice, amendment of life and reconciliation." The Rt. Rev. Whayne M. Hougland Jr., along with the people and leadership of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Michigan and the Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Michigan, have spent the last year working both individually and corporately toward this high calling. While I have held out hope that this difficult and holy work would result in Bishop Hougland's return to service with your two dioceses, mutual discernment has revealed a need to end your relationship as bishop and dioceses. I affirm both the integrity of your discernment and your decision growing out of it.

As we turn toward the future, I offer my blessing upon your two great dioceses as you continue your commitment to creatively explore collaborative ministries across diocesan lines. This bold experiment in mission is surely born of the Spirit and offers a hope-filled model for the rest of the church. Keep up the good work; continue striving toward healing and reconciliation; hold one another in prayer. And remember that God is with you always.

Over the next few years, in a process facilitated by the Building Bridges Steering Committee, we will continue our intentional exploration of relationship between our two dioceses. The Standing Committees deeply value the relationship we have with one another, both in navigating the difficulties of the last year and in the continuing and developing mission and ministry of the Episcopal Church in Eastern and Western Michigan. This desire was broadly embraced, as evidenced in survey responses and our conversations with the clergy. The appointed Steering Committee has already been hard at work, beginning to invite others to help facilitate research, internal and external conversations, asset mapping, and more. This burgeoning relationship has been a deep source of joy and hope for us all.

The Standing Committees are in conversation with our Assisting Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Skip Adams, to extend his time with our dioceses over the next several months. We are also in conversation with the Presiding Bishop's Office and our consultant, Dr. Melissa Perrin, about how we might attend to the pastoral

needs of our community in the aftermath of this suspension and pending separation -- more on this to come.

Jesus said, "I am the vine and you are the branches." Our dioceses are not central administrative offices in Saginaw and Wyoming, but a network of churches and organizations and ministries and individuals from coast to coast, working together for the Kingdom of God. This has been a difficult and painful year. The news about our bishop may feel welcome to some and disappointing to others, with a bit of every other feeling in-between. The severing of a relationship with a pastor is not one that happens lightly or without deep and prolonged prayer and discernment.


