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2021 Annual Meeting Minutes

Annual Meeting - Sunday, January, 23, 2021

- The Rev. Tracie Little began the meeting at 10:30 am with an explanation of how the hybrid (inperson and via Zoom) meeting would work (i.e. how to present and ask questions).
- Dave Rayner co-host on Zoom will let people in as they come and keep attendance.
- Elizabeth Sailus appointed as secretary by Tracie. No objections.
- Tracie moves to authorize the meeting of St. Jude's Episcopal Church to be done as a hybrid meeting partially online:

The Chair will entertain a motion to authorize the annual meeting of St. Jude's Episcopal Church in Fenton, MI to be done online. All official actions conducted during the meeting will be official actions of the annual meeting of St. Jude's, Fenton as required by the Canons of the Episcopal Church and the Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Michigan.

- Dee Grossmann so moved and Lynn Hopper seconded. Approval by acclimation.
- Recording began late at 10:40 am by Tracie.

Questions for Rector, Deacon or Vestry - No Questions

Presentation of 2021 Finances – Clay Putnam presented

- Beginning on page 18 of 2021 Annual Booklet
- **Income** Pledge & Plate were \$15,394.00 above what was budgeted. Most of that was in offering. Other income was about \$1,700.00 more than what was budgeted. Total income we were over what was budgeted by \$17,099.73.
- **Expenses** Overall we projected a budget of \$26,657.36 in expenses.
- **Overall** We ended up favorable by \$19,031.00 most of that was due to receive more income than expected.
- **Balance Sheet** Custodial Funds are held for a specific purpose. Our bank account has around \$22,000. We get concerned when it is under \$10,000 which hasn't happened this past year.
- **Investment Activity** General Investments have gone up about 15%. Endowments have gone up 6%.
- There was a motion to accept the 2021 financial reports as presented. Ron Trimmer seconded and the reports were accepted by acclimation.
- Tracie Little added that this is the first year since she has been the Rector that we did not have to draw from our savings/investments (when the bank account gets low, we automatically do that).

 ministry, let Tracie know.
- Goal 3: A Time of Visioning and Discernment A carry over from last year since Covid prevented us to fully be able to explore that in 2021.

Budget 2022 - Clay Putnam presented

- Beginning on page 34 of 2021 Annual Booklet
- Budget is created by finance and endowment committee which is then reviewed, edited and approved by the Vestry.
- The difference between income actual and budgeted for 2022 offerings, we left it the same amount even though we received a lot more this year since offerings is so variable.
- Expenses went up as cost of living is up this year so we raised salaries. We also adjusted some lines because we are back meeting in church (i.e.- altar supplies).
- Formation significantly decreased because our youth minister resigned and at this time there is no plan for a replacement so those expenses were taken out of 2022 budget.
- Building and grounds kept pretty much the same as last year.

- Projecting a \$24,806.00 deficit. We hope to achieve better as we did in 2021.
- Thank you to all of the finance team, administrative assistant and treasurer.



My second year on Vestry brought me an opportunity to serve St. Jude's as its Senior Warden. Little did I know how much would occur in our Parish during the year 2022. Yet I was excited to know that I could contribute some of my skills to our Parish.

We continue to work through what the pandemic has done to our world and our lives and the life at St. Jude's. As we shifted gears on how we worship we also continued some of the changes utilized during the pandemic itself.

A month after I accepted the position of senior warden, we found out that our priest, the Reverend Tracie Little, had accepted a position as Canon to the Ordinary in our Diocese and would be leaving in March. And many thanks go to Reverend Mike Marinco, Reverend Judy Marinco and Reverend Paul Brunell who all faithfully have led our congregation in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist throughout the year.

Our Vestry this year had a lot to tackle.

Senior Warden's 2022 Report

We often would review the Diocesan covid procedural changes and would have to make recommendations for our building and worhip which our parish would follow. We had to handle the solicitations and evaluations and awarding of contracts for the replacement of the Air conditioning unit in Vandenbergh Hall and also the repair of our furnace. We selected individuals for the Selection Committee for the search of a new Rector. And, as always, we received advice from our finance committee that continues to give the Vestry recommendations on how we can use our finances.

During 2022, we continued to make new ways into the future of technology and improve our live streaming for both our Wednesday Morning Prayer services handled by our lay people, Supply Priests and Deacon and our Sunday Holy Eucharist which we also live streamed. The goal of this technology is to allow those unable to attend in person to attend and be a part of a larger group in prayer.

I have learned that the St. Jude's family has brought me closer to my faith and that God is with me everyday and not just on Sunday mornings. God is with each of us everyday through the good and through the bad. I have had a very supportive spouse working with me and helping me along the way.

I am so appreciative of all of you.

This year....

Wow, this year was a challenge again in more ways than we could have ever imagined. The announcement that our priest had accepted a call to serve as Canon to the Ordinary in the Diocese of Eastern Michigan was made in February. We celebrated The Rev. Dr. Tracie Little's ministry of 6 years at St. Jude's on March 6th. Then the hard work began for the Vestry, The Search Committee, and all the active ministries that make St. Jude's the wonderful place it is to worship and to be a part of. And we, with the help of God, continue to do just that.

In September we had a meeting and refresher training for the Lay Eucharistic Visitors (LEVs), to activate a ministry that is important and necessary to all. Each Sunday, we as the Body of Christ, send out a LEV to take eucharist to anyone who is unable to join us at our corporate service. A request for a visit can be made by calling the church office.

As a Canonical Resident of the Diocese of Eastern Michigan, I participate monthly as I can in the Flint River Valley Convocation Clergy zoom meetings. It's a great group of people who listen to and support each other at meetings, and through calls, cards, text messages, and prayers.

In November, St. Jude's participated in the Fenton Area Churches Thanksgiving Service Project. Hats, scarves and gloves/mittens were collected for Carriage Town Ministries in Flint. Sunday afternoon on November 20th, volunteers gathered at the United Methodist Church Family Life Center to put together "cold weather kits" from the donations collected at several churches. The goal was to make 350 kits. Miraculously, like

the loaves and fishes, we were able to assemble 1,000 kits! Thank you to those who so generously donated, and to those who worked to fill the kits. It was a great ecumenical outreach project from the Fenton Area faith communities.

On November 6th, I celebrated the 12th Anniversary of my Ordination to the Diaconate. It's hard to believe that the time went by so quickly.

As this year comes to a close, I pray for each and everyone of you. I give thanks for the love, fellowship, friendship, and ministry of this great faith community of which I am honored to serve as your Deacon.

Supply Priests' Reflection on 2022

We would like to thank the people of St. Jude's for inviting us to come celebrate with you on Sunday mornings while you search for a new priest.

The process to find a new priest is not as easy one. It is a time-consuming and sometimes frustrating thing for all churches that have to go through. But you are very lucky because you have an excellent lay ministry in place that lets you operate your church without a priest for most things. As most of you know a priest is really only needed for what we call the ABC's, Absolution, Consecration, and Blessing. Almost anything else can be done by trained Lay Persons.

Your dedicated parishioners have really stepped up to the plate. You have an excellent music ministry, outreach ministry, vestry and wardens, search committee, secretary, building and grounds committee, finance committee, sexton, worship and event schedulers, intercessors and lectors, Christian formation, altar guild and EVs and EMs. You also have many more dedicated people that, when asked to do a job, just do it. All these jobs need to be done for a church to continue to operate. Since Tracie's leaving you seem to have not missed a beat.

Your congregation has been very supportive of us. Coming to a church that has a deacon is a wonderful thing for a priest. It makes our job a lot easier. Having 50 or more people in church on a Sunday has been a wonderful surprise for us and has made the job of celebrating with you on Sundays a real joy.

Finance & Endowment

During 2022 our committee met five times. In addition to finance activities, endowment funds activity was also carried out by the same meeting participants. Over three of the meetings our committee decided not to distribute endowment funds in 2022 due to current financial market conditions and low availability of temporary restricted funds needed to approve distributions.

The 2022 budget that was approved by the Vestry in December 2021 was upended in early January when the congregation was notified that our rector had accepted another position within the church. This change in direction was positive from a financial perspective, as we were no longer paying for a rector's services. Over three meetings the Finance & Endowment Committee discussed and came up with a revised budget that reflected what we thought would happen in 2022 after our priest's departure. The savings from not having a rector were offset by a very poor year in the financial investment marketplace. Even with all of the change, parish members helped to keep St. Jude's stable from a financial perspective.

In addition to our regular activities, the Finance & Endowment Committee was asked to take on a number of rector transition tasks to prepare for the priest search process. In May we met and put together a proposed salary and benefits package for a new priest. We also adopted the diocese recommendations for transition budget to cover the search process and moving expenses that we expect to incur in the search process. Our recommendations were presented to and approved by the Vestry.

At the May meeting we also updated our long-term financial forecast based upon current church demographics and recent church and diocese history. This information was presented to our Vestry and the diocese consultant being used to perform the rector transition process.

The final activity for the year was preparation of a proposed 2023 budget. This was accomplished over the last three meetings. Our primary assumption for the 2023 budget was that we would have our new priest start half way through the year on July 1st. We used the target priest salary and benefits numbers to complete the budget. The COLA adjustment was significantly higher than in previous years due to our current inflation rate. Based upon pledges received and funding only half a year of priest expenses, a fairly balanced budget was recommended to the Vestry. The final budget was approved by the Vestry at their December meeting without change.

Bob Alexander, Charlie Johnston, Clay Putnam, Dave Rayner, Jerry Rucker, John Pettipher, and Michelle Gangwer are current members of the committee. Our Vestry liaison is Lois Hartranft. We rely on parish members to fill committee positions and carry out our unique form of ministry. If you would like to better understand and/or participate in the Finance & Endowment Committee, please contact one of our members.

Thanks to Michelle Gangwer and Liz Sailus, who provide accurate and timely financial data for the committee and church.



Music Ministry



Adult Formation

Starting January 8 – The Bible Tells Me So – Peter Enns (Protestant Theologian)



Building and Grounds

The year 2022 has come and gone and our building and grounds continue to be managed and maintained by many volunteers with very little guidance. If something needed to be repaired or cleaned-up, there was always someone willing to step in and handle the situation. We continue to have a Building and Grounds Committee that have not met in person but have communicated by emails and phone to make sure work gets done.

We as a congregation are still feeling our way through the change to processes left behind by our Covid pandemic and work to accomplish the goals of our parish related to the building and grounds.

We held a Rummage Sale in June and the funds were donated to the building and grounds maintenance fund. Thanks goes out to the volunteers that worked the event for two hot days prior to having the air conditioner fixed.

St. Jude's on behalf of the building and grounds held their second Annual Craft Show and Holiday Bazaar in November, which is a fundraiser toward a future elevator lift. This event took many working hours and parishioners to plan and execute. We brought in revenue, people from several communities and parishioners together. There was laughter, comradery and a church that was alive.

During 2022 we had to replace one of the air conditioners for Vandenbergh Hall and repair our Furnace. Thank you to Mike Wells and Clay Putnam for working on the proposals and to the Vestry for approving the proposals to have the work completed.

Also a dead maple tree on the Elizabeth

Street side of the church had to be removed along with a tree rubbing against the brick at the front of the church. Thank you to our congregation for the generous donations to fund the removal of these trees.

As far as our day-to-day upkeep of the building and the grounds our volunteers, without direction, step up and do whatever is necessary. Thank you to those volunteers for their ministry. Many people from outside of St. Jude's have said how great it is to sit in the memorial garden to pray and reflect in a peaceful and inviting space.

Looking toward 2023 there are still areas that need to be addressed and have been on the list for a few years now but seem to lack funding. They is the old brick chimney that is crumbling and needs tuck-pointing. The windows need caulking and all the wood needs to be scraped, some replacement and painting along with the steeple. The cross on the bell tower needs to be replaced.

We are looking for a Handyman Volunteer to help us as we maintain our buildings and grounds. If you're interested please let the office know.

If you are not "handy", that's fine, we invite you to donate that extra dollar to the Building and Grounds maintenance account. We have many projects to put your donation to good use to keep our building in working order.





Background

The Outreach Ministry Team was formed in October of 2003 and has been active since that time. Like 2020 and 2021, this year was a bit different than past years due to the pandemic. We completed many of our usual activities but did hold off on some events to avoid too much personal contact (Truckload Giveaways for example). Below are details on some of our 2022 activities.

Community Pantry Program

This year we opened our Basic Needs Pantry the first Saturday of every month. Many of our quests receive some sort of government assistance, but only food items can be purchased with this aid. Our goal with the pantry is to provide those nonfood necessities that are not included. We provide toilet paper, paper towels, personal hygiene items, cleaning products and diapers. In addition, we provide meat as it is available through the Food bank since this is often a major expense for our guests. On Saturday mornings we generally serve about 40 families with 60 children. In addition, we continue to provide similar products to 18 residents of Millpond Manor on the first Thursday of each month. We also continued our School Lunch Program, now in its 15th year, serving over 200 people. While our food distribution has been mostly reduced to meat and dairy products, we still have a significant amount of product in the food pantry and have been serving 10 – 16 Family Promise families each month since May. Again, this year we were able to provide fresh produce during August – October thanks to Starr Farms. We also worked with FARR to provide Thanksgiving food baskets and Turkeys to 32 residents at Millpond Manor. Finally, in partnership with Family Promise and Landaal Packaging, we obtained 50 frozen turkeys that we will distribute to our regular Saturday guests over the coming weeks. In total in 2022, we provided 753 months' worth of pantry items. Since the beginning of the pandemic, in addition to the pantry items, we have also provided the equivalent of more than 70,000 meals.

Family Promise

We continue to be active members of the Family Promise organization, though no families were in church rotation during 2022 due to covid-19. Instead, the Family Promise staff worked on preventing homelessness and supporting families that had been placed in homes but needed continued support. St. Jude's provided food for these families on a regular basis and two members of St. Jude's Outreach are active members of committees of the Family Promise Board of Directors.

Socks

We once again had a very successful sock drive and provided more than 1,200 pairs of socks to CrossOver Downtown Ministries. Socks continue to be one of the most requested items from shelters, especially in the winter months.

Christmas Families

In 2022 we adopted 5 families from Family Promise with a total of 11 children, as well as 6 residents of a Group Home in Holly. In total this made 23 people that we provided gifts/gift cards for. This year we again chose to purchase gift cards instead of gifts for a couple of reasons. First, we believe it gives a bit more dignity to parents to be able to purchase gifts for their own children. Second, we felt it much safer to have parents doing

the purchasing and wrapping. We also purchased wrapping paper this year so the parents could wrap their own gifts for their children We also purchased \$25 gas cards for each of the parents and for the employees (8) of the Group Home.

Funding / Donations

While our expenditures have risen some in 2022 due to the cost and mix of products that we provide, the generosity of the congregation and the surrounding community continues to astound We received two grants in 2022 totaling \$11,900 and in December we received a \$1,200 donation from The Laundry and their clientele. Most importantly, we continue to receive endless support from the congregation. For example, in October you donated over \$650 on one Sunday to purchase socks; in December you donated over \$1,600 on one Sunday to provide gifts for Christmas Families; and throughout the year you have donated 100's of volunteer hours to keep the pantries running. We cannot thank you enough for the support you provide for these programs and the community. You really are living out your faith!



We hope to find a new Rector in 2023 with the assistance of our Search Committee. We continue to move to normal lives after the covid pandemic. In doing so, we have begun to improve areas that allow us to reach out. Our livestreaming of both Morning Prayer on Wednesday mornings and of our Holy Eucharist in our church on Sunday Mornings is one of the biggest ways we have been able to do this. We thank Greg Forsyth and his team for improving our live steaming by bringing better sound and picture into our homes. We now can also live stream the service to a television in Vandenbergh Hall for over flow of services or funerals. Everyone will have an opportunity to be a part of our service. We are working on our Internet and phone systems so that our lower level is accessible.

Deacon Judy Marinico has trained and put together a Lay Eucharistic Visitors team that has and will continue go into homes to offer Holy Eucharist to those requesting it. Others have set up In-Reach to assist those individuals that may need a ride to church. Hopefully, in early February, we will reopen our nursery for those requesting to use the space for young children during our services.

When it comes to our building and grounds we have added three new members to our building and grounds committee. Our parish still has many projects that need to be addressed and have little funds to do the projects. In 2023 we are hoping to replace the handicap ramp, reverse the door to the memorial garden to accommodate the handicap, tuck point the brick chimney in

the basement, scrape, chalk and paint all the woodwork and repair the wooden slats on the steeple. We also would like to replace the cross that fell from the bell tower. It is the intent to try and secure a couple of grants to cover some of the expenses. All donations to these projects would be appreciated.
