Notice of Retirement

Please accept this letter as formal notice of my retirement as Music Director of St. Jude's Episcopal Church effective after worship service on Sunday, June 4, 2023. This decision has not come easily or without some sadness. I began my ministry on September 1, 1996, under the rectorship of the Rev. Elizabeth Morris Downie. These years have seen much growth and variety in the worship at St. Jude's. There have been many changes in the personnel of the choir, but its principal purpose of leading worship remains the same. It was Rev. Downie's suggestion to form a handbell choir. It has been my privilege to direct this fine group.

I have so enjoyed leading the musicians here. They are dedicated and talented. They may not always agree with what I may request of them to do, but they come through. I will miss every one of them.

When I arrived, no records had been kept on choir anthems or hymns. There are now records on all of these that can be referenced. It has been my pleasure to create most of the music that is reproduced in the bulletins with music notation software on my computer.

St. Jude's has a rich history of choirs and choral music. The choral library was already very fine, and I was able to expand and update it while keeping the traditional music of the past that is timeless.

St. Jude's is blest with a fine organ. My colleagues agree! It possesses the correct sounds to lead the congregation very well. It has been my privilege to be the caretaker of it.

I played my first church service as an organist in November of 1970. That is a career of over 52 years! This past 27 years at St. Jude's is the longest time I have worshiped at one church in my life. The friendships and experiences here are priceless and make this decision all the more difficult, but it is time.

It has been my pleasure to serve as Music Director of St. Jude's. I will assist in any way I can during this transition.

What is a Vigil?

To be on a vigil is to be wakeful for a purpose. To the ancient Romans, that could be to stand guard, spy on the activities of a possible enemy, or prepare for a holy occasion. Originally, the desire to take part in the holy occasion is so strong that you can't wait for it to happen, which means you're so full of determination that waiting and getting ready is all you can do, to the neglect of sleep or food. You don't want to miss a second of it.

Many congregations, following their Maundy Thursday liturgy and stripping of the altar, hold a vigil, a watch, until noon on Good Friday.

"Could you not keep awake one hour?" were the words of Jesus in reproach to his followers in the first Gethsemane. Ever since, his disciples of subsequent generations have attempted to do better, and in some small way to make up what was lacking in the first bunch.

We will be offering a time of vigil again this year from 9 p.m. on Maundy Thursday until noon on Good Friday. You are invited to participate from home. There will be a sign up online for those who choose to participate online and on the bulletin board in Vandenbergh Hall on Sundays. If you wish to participate in our prayer watch, reading portions of the Psalms or any of the Gospels of the readings

for Holy Week could be used. For some people, participating for an hour at a vigil is a daunting task. An hour can seem like a long time to spend in prayer. It isn't meant to be easy or routine. It is a time to be in conversation with God. While it may be a challenge, it can be a wonder-filled, grace-filled blessing.

It is a beautiful custom, one where it is possible to feel an added weight in the air. In essence we are asked to accompany Jesus to the Garden and console him during his great agony. All one needs for prayer on this sacred night is to simply imagine the scene and enter into the sacred night before Jesus' death on the cross. It is extremely powerful to imagine being there with Jesus in the Garden, as he prepares to sacrifice himself for our sins

Be Humble Day

He humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross!

Philippians 2:8



I'm often amused by the unofficial holidays people come up with. February alone has a Sticky Bun Day, a Sword Swallowers Day, even a Dog Biscuit Appreciation Day! Today has been labeled Be Humble Day. Universally recognized as a virtue, humility is certainly worth celebrating. But interestingly, this hasn't always been the case.

Humility was considered a weakness, not a virtue, in the ancient world, which prized honor instead. Boasting about one's achievements was expected, and you sought to raise your status, never lower it. Humility meant inferiority, like a servant to a master. But all this changed, historians say, at Jesus' crucifixion. There, the One who was "in very nature God" gave up His divine status to become "a

servant" and "humbled himself" to die for others (Philippians 2:6–8). Such a praiseworthy act forced humility to be redefined. By the end of the first century, even secular writers were calling humility a virtue because of what Christ had done.

Every time someone is praised for being humble today, the gospel is being subtly preached. For without Jesus, humility wouldn't be "good," or a Be Humble Day even thinkable. Christ relinquished His status for us, revealing through all history the humble nature of God.

There is a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board in Vandenbergh Hall if you wish to sign up to host a Sunday Coffee Hour.


EASTER FLOWERS
