# Francis the Saint in Real Life

In the summer of 2016, our family went to Umbria in Italy as a graduation trip for our elder daughter, Margo. One day our host took us to the town of Assisi, famous for the churches founded or inspired by St Francis. He was so beloved during his life, and so quickly declared a saint after his death, that frescoes by artists

who actually met him still exist. Like this one, which is in the Benedictine abbey of Saint Scholastica, near Rome, where Francis spent time in retreat in 1228!

I'd learned quite a bit about Francis from annual observances of his feast (his date is October 4) with a "Blessing of the Animals" frequently included. Many stories of Francis include his befriending animals and preaching to birds. Famously he negotiated with a fearsome wolf that was raiding farms around the town of Gubbio, into stopping his attacks if the residents would feed him their scraps instead.

We walked around Assisi, visited



the medieval churches dedicated to Francis and his friend Sr. Clare, and even prayed near his tomb, which is surrounded by those of his first monks. There was a display behind glass of Francis's clothes and sandals that had been made or repaired by Clare. The real things, right there in front of us, nearly 800 years old. We

also drove to the aforementioned Gubbio, with its own sainted bishop whose remains could be viewed under glass. That was a little too real!

A few St Francis facts, as we prepare to celebrate his life and his love for all God's creatures:

 Two of his writings are in the BCP and Hymnal. The prayer "Lord, make me an instrument of your peace" (BCP p. 833) is ascribed to him (I love this version sung by Sarah McLachlan and friends). "The Canticle of Brother Sun and Sister Moon" which we've

been singing as our "Song of Praise," was adapted a little differently at our Hymnal's # 400.

 During a time of intense prayer, Francis had a vision of Christ and received the stigmata – the five

wounds of Jesus' crucifixion in his own hands, feet and side. Which would sometimes bleed during the remaining two years of his life! The anonymous portrait at the beginning of this article was done earlier in Francis's life, sans stigmata; but later images, such as Cimabue's at right, include the marks. Francis was the first recorded person to get the stigmata, but I can't say I envy him.

Francis also began the enactment of the nativity scene with live animals (an ox and a donkey) and an empty manger with straw, after visiting Bethlehem. Francis had accompanied

European Crusaders to the Holy Land, and there he realized how very poor Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus had been. As Francis knelt at the scene he put together back home in Italy, onlookers testified that there was an apparition of the Christ Child lying in that manger, whom Francis leaned forward to embrace.

I hope you will enjoy our commemoration of

this real person with astonishing traits and mythologized abilities. What we know for sure is that Francis of Assisi turned his town, the church, and the wider world toward a simpler understanding of Christianity, and a greater respect for all God's creatures. No wonder his Franciscan order is still a vibrant understanding of following Jesus; and he serves as the patron saint of animals, ecological efforts, poor people, and his beautiful home country, Italy. And bring your pet for a blessing this Sunday between 12-12:30. I can't promise any miraculous behavior negotiations, but I'll do my best.

# Shooting Ourselves in the Foot

Teacher, "they said, "we want you to do for us whatever we ask.

Mark 10:35



In 2021, an engineer with the ambition to shoot an arrow farther than anyone in history took aim at the record of 2,028 feet. While lying on his back on a salt flat, he drew back the bowstring of his personally designed foot bow and prepared to launch the projectile to what he hoped would be a new record distance of more than a mile (5,280 feet). Taking a deep breath, he let the arrow fly. It didn't travel a mile. In fact, it traveled less than a foot—launching into his foot and causing considerable damage. Ouch!

Sometimes we can figuratively shoot ourselves in the foot with misguided ambition. James and John knew what it meant to ambitiously seek something good, but for the wrong reasons. They asked Jesus to

"let one of us sit at your right and the other at your left in your glory" (Mark 10:37). Jesus had told the disciples they would "sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel" (Matthew 19:28), so it's easy to see why they made this request. The problem? They were selfishly seeking their own lofty position and power in Christ's glory. Jesus told them that their ambition was misplaced (Mark 10:38) and that "whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant" (v. 43).

As we aim to do good and great things for Christ, may we seek His wisdom and direction—humbly serving others as He did so well (v. 45).

# Many Ways to Give with Gratitude

"How shall I repay the Lord for all the good things he has done for me?" asks Psalm 116:10. At a recent meeting of the Finance and Investment Committee, we made a list of ways most often used, and there are a lot! Are there any we've missed?

- 1. Instruct your bank to send St Jude's a regular payment. It comes as a check, with no fees to us.
- 2. Set up a regular online transfer from your account to St Jude's. Ask Liz in the office for help with this (VANCO charges us a small amount)
- 3. Bring or send us a hand-written check; with or without a numbered Giving Envelope
- 4. Use a credit card through our website www.stjudesfenton.com. Click on Donate at the top, and then option 1.
- 5. Transfer funds directly from your IRA, tax free as a part of your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). Note: RMD's are required after age 73, but tax-free transfers are allowable once you have reached 70 -1/2.
- 6. Text STJUDESCHURCH to 73256, followed by your gift amount, for a one-time donation.
- 7. Put cash into the offering plate, preferably paper! (No receipt is possible without an envelope)
- 8. Instruct your brokerage to transfer securities or other investments, should this be advisable at tax time. Ask Clay P. for more info on this. (We sell all such gifts as soon as practicable.)


