Happy New Year!

Which would be... this Sunday? Oh, you've heard this before. The First Sunday of Advent (that's this one coming up) begins the new liturgical year, and a bunch of things always change. Here is a glimpse of what you can expect to see, pray and sing differently, in our Sunday worship.

Lighting the candles of our Advent Wreath: You will see right away that the wreath is back. This Advent we will light, week to week, Blue-Blue-Pink-Blue; and White on Christmas Eve. I've returned Pink to the line-up because I enjoy the tradition of "Gaudete" or "Rejoice" Sunday, an old tradition for the Third Sunday of Advent when a reading from Paul's Letter to the Philippians was customary: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice!"

Churches that use purple hangings in Advent tend to use



purple candles, instead of blue. But we have blue hangings, as you will see.

Some churches light their pink candle on the last Sunday of Advent, when the Gospel reading is the Virgin Mary's story. There are different traditions to name the four candles:

Prophecy Candle – Bethlehem Candle – Shepherd's Candle – Angel's Candle; or more simply, Hope – Peace – Joy – Love. I like: Watch – Prepare – Rejoice – Receive.

The vestments and hangings are Blue: St. Jude's is blessed to have both blue and purple sets; and purple gets used in Lent, in most Episcopal churches; and often in Advent, too. So why blue? Dark blue is the color of the night sky, where the smallest of lights is visible and gives hope. Medium blue is the traditional color for the Virgin Mary, as you can see in almost any painting of her. Which shade of blue would you say we have, and how does it color your understanding of Advent?

Assigning colors to a season is relatively recent, ie since the

1500's. In the old-old days, a wealthy cathedral might have more than one set of hangings, but most churches would not. Later, as a variety of fabrics became more accessible, English cathedrals like Salisbury, York and Westminster chose a palette for the seasons; and neighboring churches copied them.

Distinctive readings and music for our expectations: What age and mood of Jesus are we anticipating? We begin Advent with a vision of his return, the "parousia" at the end of the age, when Christ will come back as our judge and king. We got a flavor of that in last week's Gospel; this week, the descriptions are even more dire! Then we get his first adult appearance, heralded by John the Baptist. Finally, we get to anticipate Jesus' birth into the family of Mary and Joseph of Nazareth.

The worldwide Church thinks about Jesus' first coming and second coming during Advent, simultaneously. It's too easy to anticipate just a cuddly baby in a manger (or wherever) and ignore the bold images of his return as he checks up on us. Try to hold them in tension throughout the season, especially at gift-giving opportunities.

Ringing in the changes: With the help of our Ushers, we will make generous use of our tower bell to let the world know we are at worship and they are welcome, too!

Historically, church bells alerted townspeople and, especially, farm workers that it was time for prayer. If they could make it over to the church, great! If not, they could join in prayer right where they were. "The changes," in bell terminology, are a cyclical pattern of ringing all the bells in every combination when a church has a set of them. Remember calculating "permutations" in algebra class? Me neither. But there can be a lot, depending on how many bells are in the belfry!

Seasonal adjustments: You put away the tee-shirts and brought out the sweaters. In liturgy, a change of liturgical season is an opportunity to adjust the "how, who, and what" of worship. How shall we emphasize the Advent Wreath? A song and ritual will accompany the lighting of its candles. Whose needs get remembered in our prayers? The Prayers of the People and the Eucharistic Prayer itself will reflect the messages of justice and fulfillment in Advent. What might be done more efficiently? After a few months, I've noticed some ways we might improve our procedures, such as during the Offertory / Altar preparation. Can we change it if we don't like it? Yes! Our new Worship Committee will help me get your feedback and plan future adjustments. Epiphanytide, our next season, begins January 7.

I look forward to sharing the beauty, expectation and music of Advent with you.

We are again asking for gift cards allowing each family the opportunity to purchase and wrap gifts for their own family. This year we are asking for donations of gift cards from Walmart, Meijer's and Target. We are hoping to give each person \$100 dollars to spend. Please submit your gift cards in a sealed envelope showing the cash value, and your name.

If you would like to purchase a gift instead of a gift card, the Outreach Committee will provide a list of ideas/suggestions for the Holly Group Home residents. This list will be posted in the Weekly and Monthly Beacon, as well as on the bulletin board in Vandenburg Hall. It would be great if you could review the list and call Mike and Judy Marinco (810/629-8074) to sign up for the gift or gifts you would like to purchase.

Please wrap the Group Home gift(s), and place securely on the outside of your gift a tag with the resident's name. Bring your donations to the church by our deadline of Sunday, December 12th. If you need to make special arrangements to drop off your donation, please call one of the Christmas Family Committee Members listed below.

In addition, this year the Outreach Committee is ordering Christmas Food Boxes from the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan to give to each family that comes to the Basic Needs Pantry the first Saturday in December. These boxes contain canned goods along with frozen meats that can be used to prepare Christmas dinner and additional meals. The cost is approximately \$25 per box.

As an alternative to purchasing a gift(s) or gift cards, you may prefer to donate money to help our Christmas Families. If so, please write a check to St. Jude's, and note on the check memo line: "Christmas Families." Your check can be mailed to the church office. Donations could also be made online, make sure the fund is marked "Christmas Families".

Knowing the Shepherd's Voice

His sheep follow him because they know his voice.

John 10:4



When I was a boy living on a ranch in Tennessee, I spent glorious afternoons roaming with my best friend. We'd hike into the woods, ride ponies, visit the rodeo arena, and venture into the barn to watch the cowboys work the horses. But whenever I heard my dad's whistle—that clear sound slicing through the wind and all the other clatter—I'd immediately drop whatever I was doing and head home. The signal was unmistakable, and I knew I was being called by my father. Decades later, I'd still recognize that whistle.

Jesus told His disciples that He was the Shepherd, and His followers were the sheep. "The sheep listen to [the shepherd's] voice," He said. "He calls his own sheep by name and

leads them out" (John 10:3). In a time when numerous leaders and teachers sought to confuse Christ's disciples by asserting their authority, He declared that His loving voice could still be heard clearly, more distinctly than all the others. "His sheep follow [the shepherd], because they know his voice" (v. 4).

May we be careful as we listen for Jesus' voice and avoid foolishly dismissing it, for the fundamental truth remains: The Shepherd speaks clearly, and His sheep hear His voice. Perhaps through a verse of Scripture, the words of a believing friend, or the nudge of the Spirit—Jesus speaks, and we do hear.


